Affiliate Breakfast

Over the past year, Te Arawa Tangata has held five Affiliate Breakfasts at various marae. Even with a 7am start, over 30 people on average attended the breakfasts with many of them (66%) rating the event as awesome. The Affiliate Breakfasts bring Trustees from all Affiliates together to share information and contribute to the work of Te Arawa Tangata.

At the last breakfast, Eugene Berryman-Kamp presented for Te Runanga o Ngati Kea Ngati Tuara. He spoke of their vision to grow, sustain and protect the hapu so they can stand with one voice and say they are proud to be Ngati Kea Ngati Tuara.

Their iwi have been busy implementing a strategic plan from 2009 including reinvesting their TPT redistribution, beginning the restoration of Te Paiaka Lands Trust operation, organising events such as history wananga (whakapapa/whenua), waahi tapu and river trips and participating in the Te Arawa games (60 whanau members in 2011 and 150 whanau members in 2012.) Their annual Christmas hui is expected to attract over 260 whanau.

Taunakitia Te Marae Project

A big mihi to our newest team member Brian Tunui who joined the Te Arawa Tangata Team in November as an iwi intern and will be with us throughout summer. Brian is completing a Masters degree in Te Reo Maori and the Arts at Victoria University. He is working alongside Aneta on the Taunakitia Te Marae Project.

This project aims to identify factors that contribute to the development of marae as cultural, social and economic hubs as well. The project will also be promoting and supporting "marae wellbeing" in ways that are meaningful for whānau, hapū and iwi.


Te Arawa Information Framework

In November 2011, the team enlisted the help of statistics expert Kirikowhai Mikaere to develop a Te Arawa Information Framework.

The framework is a powerful tool to: inform future work programmes; provide information on Te Arawa wellbeing; identify priority areas for development; measure and monitor iwi progress.

After interviews with Affiliates, Te Arawa Entities and Government Agencies a framework with five key domains was developed as shown in the diagram on the right.

The first module within the framework to be developed was education. A group of Te Arawa Educationalists from Ngati Whakaaue, Ngati Pikiao, Lakes Trust, Ministry of Education, Correspondence School and Waiariki Polytech worked with Kirikowhai to develop key questions and an educational information report. Four key focus areas, strategic leadership, whanau engagement, key success indicators and strategic partnerships for education will be explored in 2013 further. Everyone commented that that this work is critical for Te Arawa.





Te Arawa Research Wananga

The Te Arawa Research and Development Strategy is an initiative that began under Te Arawa Lakes Trust. Te Arawa Tangata offered to assist the kaupapa through support of a Te Arawa Research Hub. Dr Tepora Emery is leading the Hub project which aims to increase Te Arawa research capacity and capability and to generate robust information and sound propositions for best social, cultural, environmental and economic outcomes for Te Arawa

In November, the Te Arawa Research Hub supported the Nga Pae o Te Maramatanga Research Symposium held here in Rotorua. Te Arawa research was showcased with presentations by: Dr Kepa Morgan, Dr Angus Macfarlane, Hiria McRae, Wetini Mitai and Dr Ngahuia Te Awekotuku.

This was followed by a Te Arawa Research Wananga at Owhata Marae. The purpose of the wananga was to strengthen relationships amongst Te Arawa researchers and forge new pathways to increase iwi initiated and needs-based research projects. A field trip on lake Rotoiti saw the sharing of scientific knowledge and Pikiao matauranga on water and lake quality.
